Expanding Our Universal Pre-K Program

Merrick Schools were among 64 districts across Long Island awarded funding from the New York State Education Department to expand their universal prekindergarten programs.

The funding further eliminates any impact to local taxpayers while affording our district the opportunity to offer more children seats in the UPK program.

The district began the program in 2022 with 81 students and expanded to 101 this school year. This funding allows the district to create 36 more spots in the program, clearing the waiting list and adding space for even more of our littlest learners.

Potential students are considered after a lottery and application process. Full-day prekindergarten classes will be housed at Birch, Chatterton and Lakeside for the upcoming year. Students attend specials such as art, music and library, as well as recess time.

The program offered to students in the district is managed and staffed by SCOPE Education Services with assistance from our school district officials. SCOPE already oversees universal prekindergarten initiatives in several additional Long Island

districts.

100 Years of Chatterton

Merrick has a long history of providing students with a quality education, dating back to 1901. A little yellow building on Smith Street housed 38 students and one teacher for decades. For reference, we now have approximately 1,500 students spread across our three school buildings.

The district's first modern school, the red-brick Chatterton School, was built in 1923, and expanded over the years to support growing enrollment. The most recent expansion was a 5,800-square-foot addition, opened in 2020, that provided a second multipurpose room, as well as a space for the school's academic intervention services.

The Merrick Avenue building has continuously operated for a century, and for years was the district's lone school until Lakeside was built in 1952 and Birch was built in 1960.

Birch Writing Club Earns First-Place Poetry Award

Members of the Writing Club at Birch School are now published authors after they placed first in their grade-level category in the Walt Whitman Birthplace Association's 38th annual Student Poetry Contest. Eight fourth graders in the Writing Club drew inspiration from Whitman's poem, "Song of the Open Road," and penned their own pieces. The anthology of individual poems earned first place out of nearly 5,000 submissions and were later published in a book. On May 5, the students were invited



to the Walt Whitman Birthplace in Huntington Station to read their poems aloud and were presented with an award. Students were able to tour the grounds and exhibits at the house where Walt Whitman was born in 1819.
